


### FEBRUARY IS DENTAL HEALTH MONTH!

Your pets' dental health is important every month of the year but February is when we raise awareness about the importance of treating dental disease. You may have noticed some tartar or calculus (hard, brown) or plaque (soft, yellow) on your pet's teeth, but did you know that what is going on below the gumline can be much worse? This is why it is so important to have a dental cleaning, dental x-rays, and oral exam performed at least annually. Some pets are more affected than others and may need dental prophylaxis even more frequently. Humans go to their dentist every 6 months. Pets' teeth are no different than ours, and they put arguably much grosser things in their mouths!

The most common dental disease that we see is periodontal disease. Here are the stages:













Stage 1: Gingivitis, Plaque (Reversible)
\*This is best time for a dental cleaning!\*







**Stage 3:** Moderate periodontitis, more calculus, gingival loss, 25-50% bone loss (bone loss Irreversible)

**Stage 2:** Early periodontitis, calculus, up to 25% bone loss, causes pain and odor (bone loss Irreversible)







**Stage 4:** Severe periodontitis, >50% bone loss, infection that can spread to liver, kidney, or heart (*Irreversible*)

The two next most common dental diseases we see may only be identified once we do an anesthetized oral exam and dental x-rays.

#### **Tooth Root Abscesses**

This is when infection gets into the pulp usually by trauma or fracture, then spreads to the apex of the root, destroying bone and causing severe pain. When this goes undetected, it can continue to spread through the bone causing swelling on the surface (below the eye, or along the jaw). Extraction of the tooth is necessary to resolve the infection.

### Resorptive Lesions

These are most often seen in cats. In fact, it affects up to 60% of them! Meoowwch! It is still unknown exactly what causes these painful cavity-like lesions. We do know genetics play a role. These lesions can start in the crown, root, or both and continue to eat away the tooth until the tooth is completely gone. Extraction of the tooth in cats is necessary to relieve the pain.




### WHAT'S NEW AT FOXRIDGE?

A lot! Even though change can be scary, every update has been made with the benefit of you and your pets in mind.

Computerized medical records: This will allow us
to keep more thorough and accurate records that
we can then share with you via email. Look for
your pet's visit summary in your email after most
visits. Be sure to add foxridgevetcare.com in
your email client so our emails don't go to your
junk folder!

- Pet Portal and Client Communications Platform: With the new Pet Portal, you can login to see your pet's medical records including their vaccine and test reminders and medication list. You can even request refills or schedule an appointment. This platform also allows us to send you text messages letting you know when your pet is ready for pick-up, awake from anesthesia, or overdue for vaccines. You can even message us back with questions! Be sure to "Opt-In" through your Pet Portal to receive text messages! - Online Pharmacy: We chose to migrate to a new online pharmacy platform in order to provide a broader selection, prescribe compounded medications (like transdermal, liquid, or flavored medications), and for seamless integration with your pet's electronic medical record.  In-house Lab Equipment: Our new in-house lab equipment can perform complete blood counts, chemistry panels, urinalysis, cytology, and fecal analysis all within minutes. We even have the ability to upload and send cytology slides to a pathologist for results within hours, instead of days. Although we can still send out non-urgent tests to the lab to help save you cost, we know that sometimes you just need to have answers right away.
